Strength: PK-12 Curriculum Nights Well-Attended

One of the many strengths of the East Rochester School District is the connection that exists between ER families and the schools.

Strength: Elementary Shared Decision Making Team

Members of the East Rochester community may be very aware of the constant bustle and activity in the Elementary School, but behind the scenes there is a group that makes it all possible. This group, the Elementary Shared Decision Making Team, is the backing to many of your favorite events.

Four elementary teachers, four parents, and an administrator make up this team. Each team member comes from their own significant place in the community, they bring their own concerns. "Parents will bring issues that they hear from the community, the teachers will bring in issues they hear about in school, and we just talk about them," says member Denise Alfieri, and since every issue carries the same weight, every member's voice is heard equally.

This year, much like past years, the Elementary Shared Decision Making Team is spotlighting the New Family Dinner and Learning Night, both of which always receive positive feedback. The former is a nerve-calming night, which provides a place for new students and their families to put a foot into East Rochester programs early in the year. New students are able to meet teachers and browse clubs they may want to join. And the latter, contrary to its name, is very kid-oriented. Learning Night includes many activities, such as musical chairs, sight-word fishing, reading dogs, and writing workshops.

All great projects must first start as an idea or goal. Last year and this year, the Elementary Shared Decision Making Team set its sights on increasing parent involvement in the school. Parents who may have negative feelings about their school experiences, tend to shy away from involvement in things pertaining to their child's schooling. The Shared Decision Making Team wants to welcome parents into the school and show them how their involvement can improve the school experience for their child and for many other children, which is always our top priority.

Three East Rochester Students Recognized for Musical Talents

Senior trumpet player Alex Ziebarth has been named to the All State Jazz Band, and is seated as the #5 jazz trumpeter statewide. Junior clarinetist Talor Marren has been named to the All State Symphony Orchestra. Talor's inclusion in the symphony means that she is one of the top three clarinetists in the state.

Talor, and sophomore flute player Haylie Cyrkin, have also been named to the Area All State orchestra and band, which are comprised of the top musicians from our eight-county region.

Achievement: Rebekah Boy Commended as Promising Scholar

Over 1.6 million students took the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test last October, and 50,000 of the highest scorers were identified. ER Senior, Rebekah Boy was one of these students. Rebekah was named a Commended Student by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Commended Students are recognized for their exceptional academic promise as demonstrated by their outstanding performance on the qualifying test.

Opportunities: Teens-and-Tots Learning Together

We are continuously looking for fiscally responsible ways to increase opportunities for East Rochester students and families. One result of these efforts is a new partnership with Monroe #1 BOCES and its Teens-and-Tots program, which is being held within the East Rochester School District facility. In the Teens-and-Tots program, eleventh and twelfth grade students from surrounding school districts work closely with 2 and 3 year old children in a BOCES-run preschool program. Participating high school students learn about stages of child development, cognitive, language, social, emotional, and physical development through research and classroom instruction and then they have the opportunity for practical application in the on-site preschool.

The Early Childhood Education Program's presence also allows participating high schoolers to offer supports within our preschool and kindergarten programs. Students push-into classrooms and support individual or small groups of students. Having another pair of hands to assist with our youngest students is an invaluable resource!

In addition to offering this opportunity for high school students, East Rochester families are eligible to send their two- and three-year-old children to the BOCES-run Early Childhood




Responsibility:

MLA Students Promote Digital Citizenship

"Privilege comes with proof of competence." This quote can be useful when teaching young adults new skills or when giving them increased responsibilities. Parents and/or teachers can assist children by letting them know that, as they demonstrate increased competence, less adult supervision may be needed--this doesn't mean that adult supervision has to disappear. One of the primary places where "privilege" and "competence" apply is in the realm of social media.

It is incumbent on all of us to model the appropriate use of social media and technology, and we should monitor the social media accounts of children. Young adults rely on role models to show them what's acceptable. Being able to use social media independently is a privilege. Its use by children should be guided and monitored so they can become increasingly competent.



Responsibility: MLA Adopts a New Vision

Faculty, staff, and students in the Middle Level Academy (MLA) helped clarify their destination by creating an MLA Vision Statement that emphasizes three necessary components for school success: Self, School, and Community. Goin' Bald for Bucks is a compassionate gesture that young people make to benefit those in need. On October 24, 11 students chose to either cut 8 inches of their hair or shave their heads. This was done to show support for a student who was diagnosed with lymphoma. Zoe Zutes, a freshman, saw an opportunity to help a friend and took a brave stand to shave her head and start a movement. Asking Zoe why she did this, she said.

"Six weeks ago when I found out Hannah was nervous about losing her hair, I dropped everything and decided to shave my head. The last thing I would want is for Hannah to feel uncomfortable in her own skin and her appearance at school."

Zoe went through the *Bald for Bucks* website and then spread the word. In a matter of days she raised hundreds of dollars to support her campaign. The amazing part is that all of the donated funds stay in Rochester and go toward the *13thirty* Cancer Center at Roswell.

Six years ago, 2017 ER graduate, Gabriella Lexer shaved her head as part of a *Bald for Bucks* fundraiser. Today Gabriella says,

"Bald for Bucks is the most rewarding experience I have had in my life thus far. I've met such amazing people because of the program and I knew I was making a difference the entire time. I honestly wouldn't be me if I hadn't done Bald for Bucks."

The act of shaving one's hair makes the person with cancer, and who has to experience much greater sacrifices, feel like they're not alone. That is a very beautiful and selfless thing. Big thanks to Mr. van Harssel who had his head shaved to show ER students how they could get involved. 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Achievement: High School Journalism Students Get Real-World Insights

Students in Ms. Hankins' Journalism class learned from two of Rochester's most prominent news people. Rebecca LeClair (pictured at left), former news anchor on Channel 10, and Justin Murphy, a writer for the *Rochester Democrat and Chronicle*, spoke to students about their experiences in journalism, communications, and marketing. In addition, students asked questions about the positive and negative impacts of technology on reporting and they learned how they can improve their craft as writers.

Mr. Stephen Dawe and Mrs. Heather Campo, communications experts from Monroe #2 BOCES, spoke with students about the practical sides of reporting, including: print requirements, website design, and things to consider when producing a final product.

When asked what she learned from meeting with people who are doing the work of journalists in real-life, ER STUDENT, **Kaitlynn Pacher** said, "It gave me an idea on what the day in the life is as a journalist. I learned things I never even thought of before talking with them." Student **Francesca Alfieri** added, "Hearing an outside source from someone who lives the life of journalism, we as a class got to see the difference between old and new news, all writing types,

A Birthday With Honor



As noted in past district newsletters our Alumni Foundation has begun a veterans' page for our website. This site serves to "honor current and former area residents who have chosen to serve and protect their country as members of America's armed forces." While there are many veterans in the area, this story is about one special veteran.

This November Wilbur H. Cooper of the ER Class of 1935 will celebrate his 100th birthday. After graduating from East Rochester Bill attended Hobart College, and soon after graduation was drafted into the army. Beginning in 1941, his 94th Infantry Division participated in maneuvers in the Tennessee woods where strategies and tactics were developed that were eventually used by General Eisenhower, who credited the Division with a major part of his victory. Bill received an honorary Masters of Military Science Degree from Cumberland University for his work. In Europe Bill and the 94th Division joined Patton's Third Army and fought in the Battle of the Bulge.

Bill still lives in the area and enjoys spending time with his family. He and his wife have been married for 71 years. Bill is a lifelong fan of big band music, and as his son says, a devoted supporter of the Buffalo Bills and the Sabres – and is praying for championships for both in his lifetime.

A few years ago, Bill delivered a copy of his book From V-Mail to Email to our East Rochester Department of Local History. The book chronicles his life from childhood through World War II to work and family, and ends with his 90th birthday in 2007. Bill shares memories of a life well-lived. The History Department appreciates his gift as well as his life's reflections.

The Alumni Foundation congratulates Bill on his 100th Birthday, and we pay tribute to him for his time served in World War II.
